

At the beginning of last year, the Directors met with Kevin Leburn who had kindly offered his expertise to look at new ways forward for the Wynd Centre. One of the vital things he suggested was the re-introduction of a full-time Manager to run and promote the Wynd. Reflecting upon this, a sub-group was set up which was led by George Paul and aided by Alex Smith and John Stewart. An advert was placed in December with three excellent candidate being called for interview. The successful candidate was Thomas Blane.

Towards the end of last year one of our longstanding directors, Alex Smith, resigned from the Board due to changing health conditions. We offer our grateful thanks to Alex and wish him a speedy recovery.

On the 1st March there was a limited re-opening of the Wynd for counselling and educational purposes. Like many others, we look forward to the Centre being fully operational again when safe to do so.

### 75 years of Christian aid- a timeline of compassion and activism

This year marks the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Christian Aid. Formed in the aftermath of the Second World to help refugees, Christian Aid holds true to the fundamental concept that everyone is equal in the sight of God. This truth has inspired them to stand together with the most marginalised people of our world, of all faiths and none, as it works to eradicate extreme poverty by tackling its root causes. Here are some of the main milestones on its journey:

1940s – raises £80 000 to help refugees in war ravaged Europe, working with partner churches to provide emergency aid

1950s Christian Aid week is launched, ongoing help for refugees

1960s Christian Aid establishes Disasters Emergency Committee

1970s Christian Aid begins to raise awareness about global issues such as racism and inequality; helps set up the New Internationalist magazine to provide a focus on global education. Campaigns on global food supply and the connection between our lifestyles and the wellbeing of people in other parts of the world

1980s Played a major role in feeding people in the disastrous Ethiopian Famine, and campaigns against apartheid in South Africa

1990s campaigns on Fair Trade and world debt, as well as helping with the crisis in the Balkans

2000s Provided emergency food and equipment for 500 000 after the disastrous Boxing Day tsunami of 2004. Highlights that corporate tax evasion in some countries exceeds the aid they receive

2010- onwards Continues to campaign for better standard of living for the poorest people and takes up the cause of climate justice.

Oakshaw Trinity has always supported the work of Christian Aid. In these difficult times, we commend their work during the Covid crisis as charities struggle with a huge drop in donations. There is much to do and Christian Aid ask us to join with them as they continue to fight for the most vulnerable.

### A prayer for March (from Christian Aid's prayer diary)

Give thanks for the Covid-19 vaccines. Give thanks especially for yourself, or any family and friends who have received a vaccine, and for the staff and key workers administering vaccines.

Pray for the poorest and most vulnerable communities across the world, for whom there is little hope of a vaccine rollout.

Pray that governments across the world will ensure fair and equitable provision of vaccines that shows the dignity and value of all people.

That said, I've had the opportunity to spend some small amount of time with those coming along to the Prayer Time on Tuesdays when we could, shared in the joy of David's celebrations of 50 years as your organist online, and attended the first Zoom (other online conferencing systems are available) Kirk Session meeting.

Listening to Rev Armstrong and Rev Lind as they shared stories and gave advice on how to, for example, support families during funerals has been invaluable, and it has been a privilege to learn from such experienced ministers.

I have shared in regular leading of prayers during the online service, compiled the sermon notes for the weekly Oracle, led worship at the beginning of February (thanks for all the kind words thereafter!) and shared the online Watchnight Service with you. I have to extend particular thanks to Sheena Miller for her help in compiling the Watchnight Service.

Generally a placement will finish at Easter – I'm really looking forward to sharing the journey of Holy Week with you – but as we now have a pathway towards the lifting of lockdown, Rev Armstrong and the Kirk Session have agreed to let me stay on a bit longer at Oakshaw Trinity and I'm delighted with the opportunity to do just that.

You may yet find me materialising when and where I'm least expected!

## Play Therapy at the Wynd - John Stewart

The first six months of the Child Play Therapy scheme ended in December, following a pilot scheme a year earlier. The scheme is for clients from 5 yrs. to 15 yrs. and complements the range of Counselling Services already provided by the Wynd under the leadership of the Counselling Manager. This means that the Wynd Centre can now offer a service for children, youths and adults. Even during the past twelve months when the service was disrupted by COVID 19 lockdown and the sporadic availability of the Centre, there has been the opportunity to purchase equipment, improve the accommodation to meet their special requirements and engage another member of staff to assist. It is also pleasing that the service was able to be used by about six children during this period.

The Child Play Therapy scheme is being supported by the Church of Scotland "Go for It" grant of £29,000 over a period of three years with match funding being provided by the Wynd Centre. Any donations towards the costs can be handed into the Church office. It is anticipated that, with the problems currently being experienced by children of all ages, the counselling service is likely to be in even more demand in the months ahead.

Lastly our thanks to all involved in looking after the fabric of the Sanctuary and Halls during these periods of lockdown.




## The Wynd Memorial Garden - John Stewart

## A different experience of Lockdown - Sandra Wilson

During this difficult time, we have all been advised to stay at home, but some businesses have been working throughout the year, as key workers. The trunk roads are vital to keep supplies moving up and down the country, and to this end, BEAR Scotland have continued to work repairing and upgrading roads and bridges across all areas.

One of the projects coming up, is the replacement of one of the expansion joints on the Forth Road Bridge. As part of the planning process for the job, it was necessary that I visit the area where the joints are being replaced, below the road deck of the bridge. We drove out onto the bridge and parked at the access point on the walkway, and climbed down to the walkway below the bridge deck, and walked out to the work area, 70m above the river Forth. I was lucky that the weather was good that day, as I am not sure I would like to be out there in the rain and snow. I have to admit that going out onto these walkways is challenging for me, as I don't really like heights, but there are times when you have to take a deep breath and do it.



This winter has been really busy for all our teams, with the gritters being out every day from the middle of December until the recent better weather arrived. This has meant being out in blizzard conditions during the night keeping roads north open, with the A9 being particularly busy. In the month of January, 38,000 tonnes of salt was used, which is much more than normal. Local children name our Gritters and we have Oor Chilly, Bear Chills and William Wall-ice. Unfortunately we lost Sir Andy Flurry this year when it went on fire. Our winter service runs until 31st of March, when the teams will then move onto resurfacing, grass cutting and upgrading the lighting to more efficient LED lighting.

There is always something different going on, every day, so I hope this has given you an insight into what goes on in the Road Industry during winter.

## Guides (11th Paisley) - Linda Kelly

The guides are still meeting every two weeks on Zoom. During the Zoom sessions the girls have been baking, learning about Fairtrade and learning the basics of British Sign Language. The girls have also been doing quizzes, games and working on badge work.

### Rocky Road Cake

#### Ingredients:

150g plain chocolate.  
150g milk chocolate.  
120g butter.  
3 tablespoons of syrup.  
14 digestive biscuits.  
1 packet of mini marshmallows.  
A little white chocolate for drizzling.  
Icing sugar to dust over at the end.



#### Method:

1. Break biscuits into small pieces in a bowl.
2. Melt butter, chocolate and syrup in a pot.
3. Add in crushed digestive biscuits and stir.
4. Add in the marshmallows and stir.
5. Put in a cake tin.
6. Put in fridge to set.
7. Drizzle with melted white chocolate.
8. Dust with icing sugar.

The girls and leaders have been invited to take part in the Paisley Division Girl Guiding Fairtrade cook/bake off. All entries must contain at least one Fairtrade ingredient with bonus points if the dish includes a banana.

We have delivered several craft packs to the girls including a Mother's Day card to colour in, scratch art magnet cupcake, make a cupcake keyring and make/decorate a wooden box/ desk tidy. Paisley Division also delivered sunflower seeds to the girls and we look forward to seeing them grow.
