

Our Counselling Service continued well under the leadership of Lloyd and Dawn. I would also like to thank the many who continue to



support the many events that are being held at the Wynd Centre and I hope that this will continue. I would also like to thank my fellow Directors for their continued help and dedication.

From the Manager - Thomas Blane

The Wynd Centre continues to move in the right direction with the usage of the centre increasing and the number of enquiries from different types of groups improving. The Auditorium continues to receive more bookings from theatre productions and we have two groups who have confirmed since visiting for a viewing two weeks ago.

The Royal National Mod have confirmed they will be booking six full days with the Wynd in October just after the Paisley Film Festival so it will be a busy few weeks for us! We will also have the cafe open on all of these days so it will be a highly profitable fortnight for us in general.

The counselling service continues to maintain its improved attendance since the turn of the year and we have calculated that since fully re-opening the service in May 2021 we have seen 376 clients so it shows the great work that is being done in the community.

The Wynd's financial situation continues to improve with various events coming up over the coming months so we are hopeful of a positive summer.

Rev. Sandy Geddes, a former Minister of St.

John's Church Paisley died aged 86 at home in Mauchline in the early hours of Easter Day, 9th April. His three children were all by his bedside. His funeral took place on Tuesday 2nd May in St Columba's Church



Stewarton - his final charge before he retired in 1989. Rev. George Lind, himself a former minister of St Columba's Church conducted the service as previously requested by Sandy. The attached photo of Sandy and Elizabeth was taken in 2011 when they were among guests of honour celebrating the Jubilee of St Columba's Church. Sandy was Ordained by the Presbytery of Aberdeen in June 1960, then inducted to Peebles St Andrew's in May 1961. He later translated to Paisley St John's in November 1966 where he stayed until he translated to Aberdeen Langstane Kirk in December 1979. Sandy then moved with his family to Stewarton St Columba's in May 1989. On retirement in 1989, Sandy and Elizabeth moved to Dumfries where he became pastoral assistant in Maxwelltown West Church. They later relocated to Mauchline to be nearer their family. They became members of Mauchline Parish Church. Sadly, Elizabeth died in October 2017. Sandy will be missed by his family and his many friends. We give thanks for his ministry and the way his life honoured the Lord.

Education, Mission, EcoCongegation Committee

A weel-kent name-Professor Willie Barclay (1907-1978) remembered.

One of the names we heard most frequently quoted at school assemblies in the 1970s was that of Willie Barclay, late Professor of Divinity and Biblical Criticism at Glasgow University, minister, author, and public broadcaster. It is perhaps hard to appreciate how weel-kent and popular a theologian he was, not only for what he said, but for how he said it- using his erudition and skill with words to bring the gospel to everyday folk. A real "lad o' pairts", born in Wick, he attended Dalziel High School, was sports champion and school captain, going on to read Classics at Glasgow, then Divinity, becoming an ordained minister in 1933 and for many years minister at Trinity Renfrew. As professor, Willie Barclay sought to make the New Testament come alive through his detailed, but highly readable commentaries, his aim being to "make the best biblical scholarship available to the average reader". He described his theology as "liberal and evangelical", which never endeared him to more conservative minded critics, who take a more literal interpretation of the bible, but he felt it important to get to the essence of Jesus and His message, rather than engage in disputes about the veracity of certain bible stories. This has continued to open him to criticism that he was too willing to dispense with core beliefs, such as the Virgin Birth and many of the miracles, but even his critics respect his sincerity and intellect which drove him to make scripture accessible and meaningful. In his 1960 book The Mind of Jesus he stated that his aim was "to make the figure of Jesus more vividly alive, so that we may know him better and love him more". Underlying his ministry, both in the parish and the lecture hall, was a desire to speak to the spirit rather than the letter of the law. As he said, "more people have been brought into the church by the kindness of Christian love than all the theological arguments in the world". The Gospel is to be lived not debated, and we are judged by how we treat each other; "If we are to accept the teaching of Jesus at all, then the only test of the reality of a man's religion is his attitude to his fellow men. The only possible proof that a man loves God is the demonstrated fact that he loves his fellow men.'

Barclay's skill lay in setting out in simple but effective phrases the reality of the Christian experience and, in doing so, making us reflect more deeply; thus, for example, "Christianity is unquestionably a personal experience. It is also unquestionably not a private experience". In contrasting the words personal and private, he is reminding us not to keep our faith to ourselves, and to focus exclusively on personal salvation, but to share the good news with others. He was able to interpret and present the message of the Bible in layman's terms, not through a word-by-word translation, but by getting the heart of the matter. This exceptionally well-read man, well versed in classical literature and biblical criticism, a professor and author of many books and papers had the insight and humanity to distil the entirety of the gospel into one simple, memorable phrase: "there are two great days in a person's life; the day they are born and the day they discover why".

O God, our Father, help us through this day so to live that we may bring help to others, credit to ourselves and to the name we bear, and joy to those that love us, and to You.

Cheerful when things go wrong; Persevering when things are difficult; Serene when things are irritating.

Enable us to be:

Helpful to those in difficulties;

Kind to those in need;

Sympathetic to those whose hearts are sore and sad.

Grant that:

Nothing may make us lose our tempers;

Nothing may take away our joy;

Nothing may ruffle our peace;

Nothing may make us bitter towards anyone.

So grant that through all this day all those with whom we work, and all those whom we meet, may see in us a reflection of the Master, whose we are, and whom we seek to serve. This we ask for Your love's sake. **Amen**

Fabric Report - Sandra Wilson (Convener)

Quotes have been obtained from Richard Irvin and James Ramsay for the refurbishment/upgrading of the heating system. The quotes are an average of £70,000.

The refurbishment would include the replacement of the boilers and the pipework in the halls. We have asked for updated quotes for these works.

If, as anticipated, we achieve 80% grants, the additional money would have to be raised by the congregation.

It was proposed that we have another Gift Day in order to raise some money towards the shortfall in the payment.

Painting - The window frames on the church halls require painting. We have a quote for doing this, but there is an additional cost of £1500.00 to remove the grills from the windows, so to save this money, we are looking for volunteers to help remove and re-install the grills. Please let me know if you can help and we can set up a working party.

Steeple and Tower - Work is ongoing by the council to remove the weathervane and start the repairs to cap and slates.

The gardeners have started their Spring / Summer work both around the Church, Eco Garden and the Wynd Centre.

Finance Report - Isabel Pearson (Treasurer)

Management Accounts to 31st March 2023

The total income for this period is £43,943 which is an increase of £6.266.

The total expenditure for this period is £37,707 which is a reduction of £5.869.

This results in a net profit of £6,236.

Although we have a small profit at the end of the quarter we cannot become complacent. Going forward we need to look at the heating system within the church and halls and this is going to cost a considerable amount of money to renew.

As agreed at the Church Annual Meeting it was agreed to hold a Gift Day to raise the monies required to allow this renewal to be completed. You will have received a letter with this magazine and I would like to encourage you to participate in this. I am sure you will all benefit from coming into a warm and welcoming church on a Sunday morning.

Can I please take this opportunity to thank those who support the church.

Presbytery Report - Jessie Cross

A large part of the recent Presbytery business has involved discussions and meetings on the Presbytery Plan. This plan is now with the General Trustees in Edinburgh and their response is awaited.


