From the Minister

Here we are once again, rapidly approaching Christmas – I wonder if the Coca-Cola lorry is all wired up and ready to hit the road once again. Last year it arrived at George Square and many of us made a trip into Glasgow to see it. However, my eye was drawn towards some of the city's homeless people who were left outside the barriers simply to watch the throngs of happy families as they enjoyed the festivities.

The joy of the Christmas story is that those very people who at the time were often excluded not only got to witness, but joined in the greatest moment in our history - Light entering the darkness, the birth of Jesus our Saviour. Shepherds were often viewed with slight suspicion, seen as rough and ready, unclean. The Magi dealt with the stars and were Gentiles, again people outside of the safe religious community. Yet it was to these, as well as to the ordinary folk in the homes and inns of Bethlehem, that the extraordinary invitation of Christmas was given. Christmas celebrates the gift of Emmanuel, God being with us through his son Jesus, so that all may know Him. Christmas is about welcome and inclusion.

At Oakshaw Trinity, this has been a year that began with many of our friends and members feeling that they had been left outside the 'barrier,' simply to watch as others got on with what they were doing. Yet, as I sit in my study and reflect on the latter part of the year, we have been blessed with new light entering into our comfortable complacency. We have welcomed many new friends into our fellowship and have been able to extend a welcome to Thomas, who is spending his first placement with us.

At Oakshaw Trinity, there are lots of ways for you to be involved, especially at Christmas, some quiet and reflective, others noisy and fun. There are always plenty of mince pies and carols with the message of Christmas at the heart. We do Christmas well! So this year let's share this with our friends and neighbours so that all may know that they are welcome to join in, not just watch from afar.

May the joy of the angels, the eagerness of the shepherds, the perseverance of the wise men, the obedience of Joseph and Mary and the peace of Christ be yours this Christmas. Amen.

Reflection on Remembrance - Jim McDougall (E.M.E.C.)

On a recent trip to the battlefields of Flanders, we were humbled to visit several of the beautifully maintained cemeteries found in this region, in and around the Ypres Salient. The land today is covered in wheat fields, stands of poplar trees, small towns and stone farm buildings. It is hard to visualise the carnage inflicted on soldiers, civilians and that gently rolling landscape just 100 years ago. We toured the tunnels of Vimy Ridge, and imagined the claustrophobic terror of being hunkered for hours below ground awaiting the order to charge. We sat in trenches and imagined the clouds of obscene gas ominously floating towards us, or being shelled day after day all to gain a pittance of muddied land, only to lose it again.

What strikes you is the sheer number of casualties- numbers so incomprehensibly large, whole battalions of "pals" and neighbours wiped out at a stroke, the utter waste of so many young lives. The statistics are truly appalling; some 19,000 British soldiers died on the 1st day of the Battle of the Somme alone. But French and German losses were as huge, to say nothing of those from all parts of the Empire- the gravestones show as many Singhs as Smiths and Schmidts.

It is difficult to make sense of such numbers, and it is only when you look at individual stones can you grasp the personal tragedy of each death. Many of the gravestones commemorate lives hardly yet began, boys not yet out of their teens; in one case, only 15 years old. Young or old, the inscriptions never fail to move. Often taken from the Bible, some are stoic or affirmative; one was heart-breaking in its directness, summing up the grief felt by so many:

Darling, we want you; we miss you. Mother. Father. Sisters, Brothers, All

What family in what little town or village the length and breadth of the country did not feel that pang of loss, so simply expressed. It seemed to get to the heart of the loss in a way that no monument ever could.

A common inscription on many stones, and one that brought comfort, was from chapter 2 of the Song of Solomon: *Until the day break and the shadows flee*

The remainder of the verse is omitted, but it continues, "...turn my Beloved and be like a gazelle or young stag on the rugged hills." It is a powerful image of hope, and speaks of the ultimate defeat of darkness and sorrow by love, when the sun rises again.

Yet many had no grave, no inscription.

On the Menin gate in Ypres are inscribed the names of over 34,000 soldiers from the Commonwealth who marched through the gate at Ypres, never to return and who have no known grave. And that is not all the names- there are too many, so others are listed at nearby Tyne Cot cemetery and at other cemeteries.

The stones bear no name nor family message, save one;

"Here lies a soldier: Known unto to God".

These words of Rudyard Kipling, who lost his own son, aged 18, in 1915, remind us that no one is truly forgotten. For everyone who pays homage at Remembrance services here or in France or the Far East or anywhere where men and women fell and died, remembers and pays due respect and remembrance not only to the known, but the unknown warrior. Even today, full honours are accorded to any soldier's remains that are uncovered in these fields of Flanders. Time has not dimmed the respect for those who gave the ultimate sacrifice. (from Ecclesiastes 44)

*And some there be, which have no memorial;
Who are perished, as though they had never been;
Their bodies are buried in peace;
But their name liveth for evermore.*

Fabric Report - Jonathan Sweeney and Ian Young

Church

We are pleased to say that, with the amount of scaffolding that was required to re-decorate our church, only two very small repairs to a pew were required and these have now been completed.

Facts on the church re-decoration:

- 100 Kg of filler used to fill cracks
- 240 Litres of paint used

The hall roof chimney head and pointing have been repaired, windows and mastic repointed, two gates repaired and PAT testing completed.

Wynd

The disabled ramp access to the auditorium was prepared and sealed, with two coats of nonslip paint applied. All hand rails outside the building and some doors were repainted.

This work was carried out by the contactor who carried out the painting work within the church (Lounsdale Decorators) at no charge.

The lighting within the Reception Area was replaced - £300.

At present, we are converting what was an office used by SSAFA into a meeting room. This room is to be named 'The Milton Room'. Estimated cost is £1,200.

Manse

Both the upstairs and downstairs boilers were replaced with a new Baxi boiler costing £2,100.

Grants

Since the last issue of Trinity we have received a grant from the Scottish Churches Trust / National Churches Trust towards the re-pointing of the church stonework. A grant has also been received from Allchurches Trust Limited towards repairing the stonework in the front of the Wynd Café /Chapel wall in School Wynd.

VAT Reclaim

Inside the Wynd Centre

News from groups that are based in the Wynd.

Paisley Child Contact Centre, has been in operation within the Wynd Centre since 1985 / 1986. It provides a weekly Saturday morning supported place throughout the year for both children and non-custodial parents.

The Contact Centre is a voluntary charitable service staffed by volunteers and volunteer co-ordinators. Referrals to use the Contact Centre come mainly from the local Court and client solicitors. All volunteers and co-ordinators are subject to Disclosure Scotland checks to determine their suitability to work with children prior to any volunteering being undertaken. Funding is sourced from local charities and grant bodies. We do not charge for our services.

One co-ordinator and two volunteers are on duty each Saturday morning from 9.00 a.m. to 1.00 p.m. A varying number of families use the Contact Centre, on a weekly / fortnightly / monthly basis. Some use the Contact Centre as a drop off / pick up point for their children.

We rely heavily on volunteers and are grateful that at present most of our volunteers belong to Oakshaw Trinity Church. We are hoping that others within the church may wish to join us in this worthwhile cause.
