

From the Minister

Dear friends,

Let me begin by thanking you for the kind words, gifts and cake that were given to mark the 25 years since my Ordination back in August. It is frightening to think that I was Licensed as a Minister two years earlier, at that time there were no vacant churches and I was asked to look after the congregation at Shieldhall and Drumoyne Church until a full status church became vacant in Dumbarton.

As we approach Christmas, I want to share a message of hope and perseverance during this time

of challenge and change in our churches with the changes within our town and presbytery, and in our world with the wars that are raging in Central Europe and the Middle East.

A young lad who was so frail and delicate that he was not able to play sports with the other boys his age, went on to became a minister. However, his health was so weak that he was unable to serve his growing congregation. Undaunted by this, he did not dwell on his troubles, and his faith thrived. His only real complaint was about the poor quality of the hymns of his day. In his mind, they did not convey hope and joy. In time, someone challenged him to write better ones. He rose to the challenge and wrote over 750 hymns.

When he died on 25th November 1748, he left one of the most remarkable collections of hymns the world has ever known. His name was Isaac Watts. In a few weeks we will be singing one of his most famous hymns, "Joy to the World!" Isaac Watts discovered joy in his life because he knew that God would never desert him. As we approach Christmas in the midst of our war-torn world, let us pray that God can bring some happiness to the innocent victims of war, and if there is some joy and happiness left; let it fill your hearts and homes this Christmas and bless you for the coming year.

Joy in the Garden

One of the pleasures of autumn is trampling through the woods at Greenbank Garden in Clarkston, admiring the changing colours of the leaves- brilliant scarlet, vivid orange or subdued yellows and greens. Occasionally a squirrel will scuttle up a tree or the resident squadron of parrots - unlikely birds for Glasgow suburbia will chatter in the higher boughs. Somehow, autumn seems the most poignant time of year; a few final weeks of blazing colours in defiance of the inevitability of the coming darkness of the winter months. Mist and moss and spider webs cling and interweave on rapidly denuded branches and a sense of nature preparing for winter is all around as the nights draw in and birds begin to roost. No matter the season, though, gardens have for centuries been places of contemplation and spirituality, offering people a haven, far from the madding crowd, a tranquil place for reflection and prayer. CS Lewis in his autobiography "Surprised by Joy" recounts a very profound, childhood experience of joy, that indefinable awareness of something greater than the everyday world, that led him finally to become a Christian. One day, his brother showed him a pretend garden he had made out of twigs, flowers and moss laid out on a biscuit tin. It was the memory of that moment rather than the actual incident that gave him a sensation, a desire, a "stab" of joy, not for the biscuit tin itself but an indefinable longing for something deeper and profound which it represented. "That garden was the first beauty I ever knew...it made me aware of nature as something cool, dewy, fresh and exuberant. As long as I live my imagination of Paradise will retain something of my brother's toy garden." Lewis defined joy as "an unsatisfied desire which is itself more desirable than any other satisfaction", further saying, "there burst upon me the idea that the visible world might be only a curtain to conceal huge realms uncharted by my simple theology".

As winter approaches, we should take time to appreciate the changing seasons, to take a walk in the church grounds or woods or gardens, and perhaps allow ourselves to glimpse beyond the curtain, to be surprised by joy.

Finance Report - Isabel Pearson (Treasurer) Management Accounts to 30th September 2023.

Total income for the 9 months to 30th September 2023 was £106,895, a decrease of £7,872.

Total expenditure for the same 9 months was £113.891, a reduction of £26,133.

Our Ministry and Mission contribution, Local Staffing Costs and Property and Other Local costs are down.

This gives us a net loss of £6,996.

Hopefully we can overturn the deficit by the end of December as we also have the Christmas Fayre that I would encourage you all to support if you can.

Can I please take this opportunity to thank those who support the church.

Heating Project - Isabel Pearson

As everyone knows we have been raising funds to replace the heating boilers.

The cost of the project is £46,420 plus VAT of £9,284. I am very pleased to announce that we have been able to secure the necessary funds to allow us to proceed with this project.

The breakdown of the monies raised are as follows:

The Gift Day and other supplementary income - £14,014 Donations from Church Organisations - £1,000

Grant received from the United Reform Church - £5,000 Other grants that have been promised with monies being received when invoice is received are:

Presbytery of Clyde - The Cargill Trust - £5,000 and Church of Scotland General Trustees - £20,000 This is a total of £45.014 – a shortfall of £1.406.

Once the invoice has been received we will be able to reclaim the VAT of £9,284.

I would like to take this opportunity of thanking each and everyone of you who contributed to this project and I am sure we all will benefit from the heating system being renewed.

Fabric Report - Sandra Wilson

The main issue for the quarter has been the replacement of the heating boilers. I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their generous donations to help us get the funds to go ahead and for the work in securing grants. It was agreed that Ramsey would be the preferred supplier and the order has been placed for the boilers; we await an installation date.

The electrical box in the church that controls the lighting requires to be replaced and we are awaiting prices for that.

Phase I of the tower and steeple repairs is now complete, with

lead capping installed, repointing of the stonework and clearing of debris.

Work on the halls has been completed as well as the refurbishment of the railings, so the building and grounds are looking really good.

Can I ask that everyone who parks within the church grounds takes care when manoeuvring in tight areas as there has been damage to cars as well as the west door, which was not reported into the office.


If you would like to contribute to the Fayre, donations can be brought to the church on a Sunday morning or can be handed into the Wynd Centre.

Trinity Theatre Group - Jean Bett


