

Mission Fund Update

What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him? If a brother or sister is poorly clothed and lacking in daily food, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace, be warmed and filled," without giving them the things needed for the body, what good is that? (James 2, 14-18)

Mission is an important part of our witness. Just before Christmas we donated £250 each from the Mission Fund to five local charities- Accord Hospice, St Vincent's Hospice, Ferguslie Pre-Five Centre, Blue Triangle Housing Project at Bruce Court and Renfrewshire Women's Aid. At the Watchnight Service we had a retiring collection for Practical Action, and throughout the year we have been collecting items for the Renfrewshire Food Bank. In the next few issues of Trinity Magazine we'll take a closer look at these organisations to get an idea of why we want to help.

Food supplies at home and abroad: Renfrewshire Food Bank and Practical Action

The Renfrewshire Food Bank was established in 2012. It is one of over 420 food banks operated by the Trussel Trust, whose simple aim is that, "together we can end hunger in the UK". In 2018 the Food Bank took in 97 tonnes of donations and over the last six months has provided nutritionally balanced food parcels for 1197 children, 680 families, 1639 single people and 284 couples. According to Elizabeth Alexander, manager of the Food Bank, the demand for food bank services is rising as people struggle with Universal Credit, and they are most grateful to local churches and schools for their ongoing support. Every week, members of our church bring in much needed supplies of tins, packets and toiletries which are then taken to the main warehouse. At Christmas, we took part in the reverse advent calendar, where we set aside a different food item each day of Advent. All donations from Paisley and Renfrew are sorted into food parcels by volunteers, to be given to people in need. The aim is to provide a minimum of three days' nutritionally-balanced emergency food to people who have been referred in crisis, as well as support to help people resolve the crises they face, by offering them advice. Across Britain over 50,000 health care and social work professionals issued emergency food vouchers, and the number of people using food banks has risen from 500,000 in 2015 to 650,000 in 2018.

People continue to have different views on the morality or effectiveness of foodbanks, but they are without doubt a life saver for desperate families in our community.

The problems of food security are a worldwide problem, and this is where Practical Action comes in. It was founded by economist EF Schumacher in 1966, as the Intermediate Technology Development Group. Their aim was based on Schumacher's concept "Small is Beautiful" and their goal is to harness local technology and skills to help address hunger and poverty in rural areas, in Africa, Asia and South America. Practical Action works with farmers to come up with low cost, low tech ways of improving crop yields, getting more water on to fields and managing land more effectively. For example, in Zimbabwe, sadly in the news again, they have introduced new crops, shown farmers how to diversify and experimented with solar powered water pumps. This one project alone has benefitted 3,000 small farmers. Lessons from Practical Action's experience are spread through consultancy services, publishing activities, education resources, advocacy and an international technical enquiries service called Practical Answers. The organisation believes in sustainable solutions that do not harm the global environment and you can read elsewhere a report from Fiona Catterson about ways in which we can do our bit for the environment.

So, thank you to everyone who contributes to the Mission fund, and we hope you will continue to do so in 2019.

Fabric Committee - Sandra Wilson

The committee would like to thank everyone who helped with Christmas decorations, particularly the new pre-lit tree which shone beautifully.

In Spring, refurbishment and re-hanging of the front gates will take place and pot holes in the car park will be filled. This will cause some disruption, as areas need to be levelled, water channels installed and finally the ground compacted and existing and new stones re-laid.

We are consulting with Renfrewshire Council with regard to repairs to the vestry ceiling as the tower is owned by them and they need to assess the works before we can progress.

April will see the start of the maintenance of the grounds and surveys have been done on the roof of the halls (due to some leaks appearing) and the church windows (mastic repairs).

Parking on a Sunday is becoming more difficult, and we ask that spaces around the church are kept for people who are unable to walk up the hill. Please make sure when parking in the grounds that enough space is left at the corners of the building to allow cars to get through easily.

Church of Scotland "Go for It" Grant funding - John Stewart

The "Go for it" Church of Scotland Fund has agreed to make a contribution of £5,000 to support the Pilot Scheme for the Child Play Therapy Scheme which, if successful, will be added to the current Counselling Services operating within the Wynd Centre. This would mean the Wynd providing counselling services available for clients from the age of 5 through to and including adult age clients. "Go For It" is a Fund of the Church of Scotland which aims to encourage creative ways of working, which develop the life and mission of the local church, and are transformative for both communities and congregations.

Say "no" to plastic!

"The amount of plastic in the world's oceans is set to treble in a decade unless action is taken to deal with the problem" (Independent, March 2018)

"Experts say it is time to change "out of sight, out of mind" approach to problems in the world's oceans" (Independent, March 2018)

A resolution was made at September's URC Synod meeting to:

1. eliminate all single use plastic straws (including Fairtrade items) from Synod meetings, from Synod Office and from events funded fully by the Synod;
2. eliminate all single use plastic and polystyrene cups from Synod meetings, from Synod Office and from events fully funded by the Synod;
3. encourage all local churches and partner organisations to adopt a similar policy;
4. ask the Church and Society Committee to examine other opportunities to reduce reliance on single use plastic and report back to future Synod meetings on this matter.

Oakshaw Trinity's response to this is:

1. to display a poster on the EMEC Notice Board encouraging members to say "no" to accepting plastic straws etc.
2. to publicise the Synod's Resolution and encourage all Organisations, Groups who use our facilities and individual members to use alternatives to plastic straws, cups, cutlery etc. at regular and "one-off" events.

Please consider carefully your use of such plastic items both for church events and for use in your own home.

Alternatives to plastic cutlery, straws, plates etc. can be sourced from Vegware, Oceansaver and other suppliers e.g. Amazon.
