

From the Minister



Dear friends,

Let me begin by thanking you on behalf of our family for your prayers, support and kindness shown to us following the death of my father on 5th December.

As I write, I am conscious of so many things happening in our world – and not all of them good. As a nation, we have broken our ties with the European Union and as a country there are many on-going debates about where we stand in relation to others. There was the devastation and destruction caused by the Australian fires. And to top it off, there was the deadly outbreak of coronavirus – Merry Christmas!

Yet, throughout all this, we do well to remember that Jesus is the centre of all we believe and how we act in the world. We believe that we are connected to God through Jesus who has come to humanity's rescue. We believe we are connected to one another as the Body of Christ. We believe God's primary way of now acting in the world, expressing God's love and redemption, is through the Church. Therefore, we invite others to connect with Jesus and connect with the Body of Christ gathered at Oakshaw Trinity Church.

As we continue our journey through Lent to Easter, come and join us, especially if you haven't been for a while. Together, we can all reassess our commitment, not just to the vows we may have made, but to the stability of Christ, who held nothing back for our salvation and who is, forever, the changeless hope on our changing world.

This event will be a chance for you to bring family and friends who claim that "Science disproves God". This DVD-led series has been well received elsewhere as an exciting rebuttal to that claim. Education, Mission, EcoCongregation Committee

We continue our spotlight on the good causes which our Mission Fund has helped to support, by looking at "Finding Your Feet", a Scottish-based charity devoted to supporting families affected by amputation or limb absence.

Losing a limb, or worse, is a traumatic experience, and as well as the obvious physical handicap, there can be a profound impact on mental health and self-worth. Many amputees suffer from social isolation, with a knock-on effect on quality of life.

"Finding your Feet" was set up by Cor Hutton, a Lochwinnoch mum, in 2014 when she had hands and legs below the knee removed after suffering from severe pneumonia and then sepsis in 2013. Recognising a need for peer support within the amputee community, she started a small group which has grown to a network of over 700 across the UK.

Such an ordeal would shatter many people, but Cor showed outstanding determination and fought her way back to full health by taking life head on. As she said to herself, "I either give up or get up". She surprised doctors by walking through Glasgow City Centre on prosthetic limbs, and since then her determination has been remarkable. She has abseiled buildings, completed the London Triathlon and was the first female quadruple amputee to climb Ben Nevis and Mount Kilimanjaro. She is a motivational speaker, working hard to remove the stigma of amputation, and, just as importantly, raise awareness of the signs of sepsis. Dubbed the silent killer, sepsis kills one person every four hours in Scotland. Thanks to a video released by Cor, and watched by many people, the Scottish Government launched a major campaign including posters across the country's pharmacies, health centres and radio advertising to make sure people were aware of the signs and symptoms of sepsis.

Only recently, after waiting five years, Cor had a double hand transplant, an incredible feat of surgery. She wrote recently in her Sunday Post column, of the debt she has to the donor:

"When I marvel at the great gift I've been given I'm also reminded of the anniversary my brave donor family is facing and my heart breaks for them. I have been thinking about my donor's family as they have just spent their first Christmas and New Year without their loved one. They know how thankful I am to be able to hold, touch and feel again after six years without hands. I will never take my new hands for granted and will push them hard with a total respect for their original owner."

Inspired by Cor, "Finding Your Feet" promotes achievement and success and provides opportunities for their Troopers (amputees) to engage in activities which challenge their -and others'- expectations. And, as they continue to raise awareness of the risks of sepsis, they are saving lives and helping to prevent amputations always being necessary in the first place.

We were delighted to present Finding Your Feet with a cheque for £330 at the January meeting of Lunch Club, with money from the Mission Fund and donations on the day. We hold Cor, her family, friends and the larger community of people who have lost limbs in our prayers. Our thanks to Sandy Scorgie for nominating the charity and making us aware of their great work.

During the last few months we concentrated our work on Christmas: supporting the Foodbank by issuing a Reverse Advent Calendar and also by promoting more sustainable wrapping paper.

As well as having a display of sustainably wrapped gifts on Communion Sunday the Eco Noticeboard in the Main Hall then had a selection of these on it over the festive period. After the success of the Zero Waste Event we held in October, we are planning to hold a Book Stall on the last Sunday in February (23rd). There will be a box left on the stage in the halls for a few weeks before then for donations: children's and adults' books. The purpose of this is to prevent used books being sent to landfill and to encourage people to pass on books they are finished with.

The Committee are also planning an Event in May. This will be slightly different to the Springwatch Event we have held for the last two years: more information will be available through Oracle and the website.

Over the last few days we have had a few unscheduled trips to A&E as a family and a few Bible verses have been in my mind: Psalm 121, especially the last two verses,

"The Lord will keep you from all harm –

he will watch over your life;

*the Lord will watch over your coming and going
both now and for evermore".*

Jesus words to the disciples in John 16:33 have also encouraged me: *"I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world."*

God has never promised to shield us from the normal ups and downs of life but he has promised to watch over us and Jesus has promised to give us his peace when we go through loss or face anxiety when loved ones take unwell. It seemed appropriate to share these verses with you after a few months when the congregation has seen many members take unwell or pass away. On our side of eternity it is natural to feel the pain of loss and be anxious during times of suffering, but we can lose sight of the reality that those we have lost are now with God in a place with no suffering or hunger or war or tears.

During my time with you I have enjoyed worshipping with you and want to take time to thank you for the words of encouragement I've received and also just as importantly the helpful feedback on areas to work on as I go through my training.

As we look ahead to the rest of 2020 it is good to remember recent success stories in the congregation's life – a wonderful Nativity service and the Christmas Jingles service, and great to remember that God also watches over us and gives us his peace as his family at Oakshaw as we seek to be a light for God in the centre of Paisley in the year ahead.




Girls' Brigade (2nd Paisley) - Karen Peacock
