From the Minister

Dear friends,

As we approach the end of the year, I am pleased to write to you this Christmas and wish each of you God's blessing and a joyous holiday.

These are times when we can all wander from the way and feel that coldness and emptiness within when we have tried to live our lives without God. Education, Mission, EcoCongregation Committee - Jim McDougall (E.M.E.C.)

"Surprised by Joy"

Earlier this summer a group of us- young and old worked together to tidy the Eco garden. We dug over the soil, pulled up countless weeds, cut back bushes, refilled the planters and planted poppy seeds. In just a few hours we had transformed the old yard into a living space, complete with bird feeders and that distinctive scent of earth and bark. The Eco garden is part of our goal to gain a gold award as an EcoCongregation and was a great example of people of all ages working as a team for the good of Oakshaw.

Our grounds are a special and revered place, but, especially in the cold, wet days we tend to scurry past as we rush from church to hall for a coffee. When did we last walk about them? But, perhaps, take a moment out of the busy day to wander around our grounds, and reflect on all the gravestones there- the Paisley families, some weel-kent names and occupations among them. There is a wealth of history about the church in our graveyard, and it is touching to look at the weathered and mossy epitaphs and to ponder on all the lives, long and brief, contained there. Our grounds add to the beauty of our lovely building, not least on a spring morning when the trees are in leaf and the birds are singing. Indeed, like all gardens it can be a source of joy

In his autobiography, "Surprised by Joy". CS Lewis describes a seemingly simple childhood experience that yet gave him a sense of pure joy. For Lewis, the idea of joy was linked to the German word *Sehnsucht*, meaning an intense longing for something unattainable. When he was six, his older brother brought into the nursery a tin lid covered in an arrangement of twigs, mosses and grass, which he had made into a miniature garden. This beautiful little garden triggered in the young Lewis a strange feeling which years later he recalled: "it was a sensation of desire; but desire for what?...Before I knew what I desired, the desire itself was gone, the whole glimpse... withdrawn, the world turned commonplace again, or only stirred by a longing for the longing that had just ceased".

Lewis ascribed these moments of joy as stabs in the heart, and who hasn't felt similar sudden quickening of the heart and spirit when something- a sunset, a piece of music, a landscape has hit us by surprise and made us and think beyond the moment. And the feeling goes just as suddenly, although the memory remains. We can't seek out or recreate the moment, but it will come when we least expect it. For Lewis, joy gave a brief insight into the holy and eternal and was essential in his journey as a Christian: "All Joy reminds. It is never a possession, always a desire for something longer ago or further away or still 'about to be'. Take time in the garden of our church, take a moment away and perhaps, when you least expect it, you will be surprised by joy.

Finance Report - Isabel Pearson (Treasurer)

The Management Accounts for the period January to September 2018 show a surplus of £3,800. Relatively income is not too bad although this has been supplemented by some Fund Raising Events. Expenditure is down very slightly from the same period in 2017. It is anticipated that the cost of heating and lighting will increase due to the Autumn and Winter sessions.


